A new internship program is providing opportunities for motivated students to transform education into action. Named to honor Michael D. Young, Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs, these interns will use their own experiences and skills to enrich the campus and apply their academic skills. The internship includes a \$1,500 scholarship.

Claudine Michel, Assistant Vice Chancellor, Student Academic Programs, Student Academic Support Services is welcoming the first cohort of Michael D. Young Interns this fall. "We wanted a program that would provide students with leadership experience and applied scholarship," says Dr. Michel. "We are giving them an opportunity to define their own projects, based on their academic interests." The four interns selected for the program will each develop and present a proposal to define their goals for the year-long program. "The proposal process gives them an opportunity to take initiative and follow a project from concept to

completion. We will help guide them, but mostly we are looking for ways to let students make decisions and experience that success on their own."

The interns will also work closely with Dr. Michel to support new Student Affairs initiatives. For example, interns will host

faculty/student mixers in the dining halls. "We're excited to bring back 'Faculty Nights'—a program which Wellness has allowed us to transfer to our interns," Dr. Michel says. "Collaborating with Housing to host dinners in the residence halls and other campus departments is a tremendous opportunity for interns to work through the details. As they enter professional life, having the confidence to build relationships will be a tremendous advantage."

This first year, all four interns were selected by referrals from Student Affairs staff. In the future, students will be able to apply for the internship directly, with recommendations from faculty. This program is ideal for students in their junior year. At that point, they have enough experience with campus to see some things that could be improved and they are not caught up in the pressure of senior year.

“When Heidi originally told me that she wanted to study abroad in Ghana, I basically said ‘No way,’” stated UCSB parent Randal Graves when reflecting on his daughter’s first discussions with him about participating in the UC Education Abroad Program (EAP). Many parents have a similar reaction when first confronted with the thought of their child leaving UCSB for a term abroad. “Like any transition in raising children, letting go was the biggest challenge,” said Traci Beaulieu whose twin daughters, Arielle and Nicole, studied in France and Spain. The good news is that EAP does a wonderful job of working with students to make sure they choose a program that is a good fit, both academically and personally. With more than 300 program options in 40 countries around the world, there is something for everyone. Students remain registered at UCSB while studying abroad and receive UC academic credit and the financial aid for

which they are eligible. “Now that Heidi is back,” says Randal, “I can definitely speak to how life-changing studying abroad was for her. She has a whole new confidence, and definitely a new appreciation for her home in the United States.” Traci was also impressed by what Arielle and Nicole learned from their time abroad. “This opportunity ignited a true interest in learning about other cultures and perspectives. I was pleased that they were taking these new perspectives and applying them to their respective areas of study. Dear UCSB Parent,

As the director of the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships here at UC Santa Barbara, I am often asked the question, “How can my student cut costs while in school?” As one might imagine, I have a plethora of ideas that include not bringing a car to campus, always looking for student discounts, and buying used books. Another idea I often bring up to parents is the possibility of their student spending a year abroad in an inexpensive country. I normally receive a look of surprise in return, but it is true. In some cases, spending a year abroad can actually be less expensive.

The University of California has a robust study abroad program and what most people do not realize is that several of their year-long programs can actually cost less than a year at UCSB, even with airfare. Currently, a year at UCSB living in the residence halls will cost approximately \$34,177. Here is a list of programs that currently cost less than UCSB from which eligible students can choose: Barbados, Beijing (China), Cairo (Egypt), Ghana, Lyon (France), Humboldt (Germany), Hong Kong, Bologna (Italy), Korea, Japan, Mexico, Netherlands, Singapore, Granada (Spain), Lund (Sweden), Taiwan, Thailand, and Turkey.

There are many things to consider when choosing to study abroad beyond the cost, so contact our Education Abroad Program or visit www.eap.ucsb.edu for more information.



New Sustainability Projects Help Us Reach Our Goals

Student Affairs recognized several years ago that the increasing cost of energy combined with a fixed energy budget would eventually create a shortfall in our ability to pay for the services we provide to our students. As a result, the Division of Student Affairs and the students of UCSB have been working together to create a vision where the goal for Student Affairs is to reach Zero Net Energy for our portfolio of buildings, including the Recreation Center and its aquatic center.

Part of that vision included the creation of the Renewable Energy Initiative Governance Board. The board is led by a student majority and tasked with creating renewable energy projects almost entirely funded by a student lock-in fee proposed by students and voted on in campus elections. A clear majority of UC Santa Barbara's students voted to create the fund and use it to help Student Affairs, and ultimately the campus, reduce its need for fossil fuel energy.

The first project from the Renewable Energy Initiative Fund is a 400kW solar

array located on top of a multi-story parking structure. With an expected completion date in spring 2014 we’ll see the students’ efforts create enough clean

energy to effectively take the Student Resource Building (80,000 sq. ft.) off the grid, equivalent to powering around 100 homes. Combined with the Division’s focus on energy efficiency projects such as the Solid State Lighting Project at the Recreation Center (also slated for completion in spring 2014), we will see an increase in effectiveness of renewable energy projects as our electricity demand is reduced.

The Solid State Lighting Project removes fluorescent fixtures and replaces them with high efficiency LED fixtures and an advanced lighting control system. We expect this system to reduce the energy consumed by the Recreation Center for lighting by over 80%. Currently, the energy being used for lighting at the Recreation Center is about equal to what we expect to generate from the new solar array. By reducing the energy consumption for lighting at the Recreation Center to less than twenty percent of present use, we will enhance the students’ sustainability efforts and continue to provide excellent student services even as utility prices increase. ■

Student Health Cares for Students

UCSB has a fully accredited health care facility offering convenient medical and psychiatric care to all registered UCSB students.

Student Health is committed to helping our students stay healthy and recover from illness quickly, as their “medical home” for coordination of all health needs when they are away from family. Information is available by phone at (805) 893-5361 or on our website at <http://studenthealth.sa.ucsb.edu/>.

A wide range of services is available, tailored to the needs of university students, including: acne clinic, advice nurse, dental care, dermatology, eye care, health education and counseling, immunizations, laboratory, minor surgery, nutrition, orthopedics, patient advocates, pharmacy, physical therapy, primary care, psychiatry, rheumatology, social work, travel medicine, urgent care, wart removal, women’s health, and x-ray. Students can make appointments online, by phone, or just come in for urgent care or to speak to the advice nurses. All services are confidential, and students may use a secure email portal for communications with clinicians.

Flu shots are available now. Please let your student know that immunizations

can help prevent lost class time due to illness. Please check our website for convenient times to obtain flu shots, both at campus locations and in the Student

Health building. We encourage students to send us their immunization records by FAX at (805) 893-2758, or email at SHSImmunizationRecords@sa.ucsb.edu.

Beginning September 23, 2013, our UCSB Student Health Insurance Program changed to a new plan administered by Aetna and is now called Gaucho Health Insurance or GHI. Students can print out their insurance I.D. for medical coverage, and cards will be mailed to their local addresses in October. This comprehensive plan includes vision coverage from Anthem Blue View Vision and dental coverage through Delta Dental. All students are enrolled in GHI unless they submit an online waiver. Verification of equivalent health insurance coverage is mandated by UC Regents’ policies.

Charges for visits, labs and x-rays at Student Health are included in the GHI premiums, with small co-payments for prescriptions and procedures. Students are encouraged to come in as often as needed to stay healthy and happy at UCSB. Student Health coordinates care by requiring referrals for non-emergency care within 50 miles of campus. Students who have waived GHI will incur discounted charges for services, which can be billed to their BARC account.

Required Risk Reduction Education for New Students

UCSB requires all new undergraduate students to complete both online and in-person education on a variety of topics related to health and safety. The online portion of the mandate utilizes the highly acclaimed, interactive program AlcoholEdu in combination with Haven, a sexual assault prevention module. GauchoFYI, an in-person, interactive 90-minute workshop conducted in small group settings, is led by trained peer facilitators and supervised by professional staff.

The online AlcoholEdu and Haven courses utilize a personalized, custom approach for each student depending on their gender, attitudes, behaviors, and readiness to change their behaviors. All responses collected by the module are confidential, with the exception of a student's name, identification number, and completion status, indicated by a passing score of 75% or higher in each section. Once the student completes AlcoholEdu, information is automatically provided about enrollment in Gaucho FYI. Last year, student feedback on both programs was overwhelmingly positive.

UCSB also offers AlcoholEdu for Parents, an online resource designed

specifically for parents of students who are required to take AlcoholEdu. The course begins with an overview of AlcoholEdu and provides talking points around alcohol for parents to use in conversations with their students. UCSB Ranks #10 'Coolest School'

Sierra magazine, a publication of the Sierra Club, ranks UCSB number 10 on its seventh annual list of "Coolest Schools." This year 162 universities and colleges were recognized for significant efforts to operate sustainably and for helping to solve climate problems. UCSB was recognized for its formidable numbers:

- 44 campus buildings are LEED certified
- 47% of academic departments offer a class about sustainability— 321 classes with 217 faculty members conducting eco-research
- 50% of fresh produce served in residence halls is locally grown with over 25% organic and/or sustainably grown
- 75% of total waste is diverted from local landfills via composting and recycling
- Since the late 1990s, Gauchos have reduced electricity use by a third, water use by a quarter, and food waste by close to 35%
- 94% of students take alternative means of transportation to class— evidenced by 10,000 bicycle parking spaces and 10 miles of bike paths

Housing Tips from Community Housing Office

They roar like wildfire through the residence halls. They have Isla Vista residents abuzz. They have property providers scrambling. And they have our office, the Community Housing Office (CHO) scratching our heads. Who are "they," you ask? "They" are the rumors that make students think they need to find next year's housing in Isla Vista too soon! Parents beware! Your students will come home as soon as November talking about where to live next June! Our advice? Resist! Slow them down and talk about all the options available before they get pressured by their friends to sign!

Here are our top five suggestions before your student signs a lease:

- 1. DO urge your student to attend CHO housing programs** around campus in mid-January to learn about all of the options. Have your student like us on FACEBOOK for dates and locations.
- 2. DON'T let peer pressure determine housing decisions.** Students are just getting to know each other and still in the honeymoon phase of their friendships. Have them ask each other questions about preferences and expectations. We have a great questionnaire they can use.
- 3. DO determine the budget ahead of time.** Talk with your student early on about what is affordable for housing costs, so the decision will fit the budget.
- 4. DON'T think that Isla Vista is the only place for students to live.** University-owned residence halls, apartments, and nearby locations are also places students live. If your student is interested in a rental outside of Isla Vista, he or she only needs to look about 30-45 days before moving in. An updated listings database is available online.
- 5. DON'T sign a contract that isn't thoroughly understood.** We encourage students to bring their lease into CHO for our staff to review it with them. In many cases, parents are also asked to sign as a parent guarantor. It will be important to know with whom your student is signing a lease, as you will be held accountable jointly and severally for all the students on the lease! ■

You deserve a round of applause. You've come a long way since March 2nd. Financial aid can be difficult to navigate. It's a highly regulated industry with constantly shifting policies and programs. It's also an incredibly hot topic both in Washington and in Sacramento, so what is true today may not necessarily be true tomorrow. Fortunately, the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships is here to help. Our website at www.finaid.ucsb.edu is chock-full of information for students and parents, and we strive to keep UCSB families informed of all the changes that may affect their federal, state, and university aid. Below are several means of keeping you current:

- **Twitter/Facebook** – Connect with us! You can follow us on Twitter or like us on Facebook. We post frequent updates regarding changes to federal and state programs, tips for financial success, and reminders for those all-important deadlines.
- **Tutorials** – We have a library of award-winning video tutorials. These tutorials walk you through important steps in the financial aid process and offer insights into some of the more misunderstood financial aid policies such as appeals and revisions.
- **Bulletins** – Our Bulletins page is continually updated with brief blog posts highlighting the biggest news in financial aid. Current topics include the recent Act of Congress to keep Direct Loan interest rates down and California's Middle Class Scholarship Program. ■

UCSB Library Expands Overnight Study

For many years, the UCSB Library has offered overnight study space for students in its 24-Hour Room (previously known as the Reserve Book Room). This popular space, near the main entrance to the library, boasted 140 study seats and was open 24/7.

In anticipation of having to shut down the 24-Hour Room during the Library Addition and Renovation Project, library staff took a close look at student needs and space availability and decided to offer an expanded overnight study area.

Now, the first two floors of the main Davidson Library are open in an Overnight Study service that begins when regular building hours end. The first two floors of the library provide access to computers, printers, photocopiers, scanners, Wi-Fi, the reference collection, and over 680 seats, making it a much richer and more productive environment

than the previous 24-Hour Room.

Overnight Study is restricted to UCSB students, faculty, and staff—who need to swipe a campus ID to gain access to the building—and is supervised by campus safety personnel. Through the campus Community Service Organization (CSO) program, students can request a free escort back to their residences during the evening and early morning hours.

For the most part, Overnight Study is available 24/7, though hours may be limited during the summer and during UCSB holidays. Before visiting, students should check current hours on the Davidson Library website.

The UCSB Library is presently undergoing a much-anticipated construction project that will result in a renovation and 60,000 sq. ft. addition, featuring 20% more study space and bookable group study rooms, among other

highlights. The library will remain open throughout the project. A grand opening is expected in January 2016. For more information and a virtual tour, visit <http://www.library.ucsb.edu/building>. ■

This year's 23rd annual GIVE project, organized by Student Affairs in collaboration with Housing and Residential Life and several other UCSB departments and local organizations, raised over \$37,000 for 12 local non-profits and community improvement projects, diverted approximately 30 tons of waste from local landfills, recycled 324 pounds of electronic waste, and collected 1,200 pounds of food for the AS Food Bank. The event, which encourages students to donate their unwanted items at the end of the year, was advertised as a "zero waste move-out" aiming, among other things, to educate students on how unwanted items can be donated and recycled. The 138 GIVE

volunteers spent more than 1,300 hours collecting and sorting donations of furniture, kitchenware, bedding, books, media, clothing, electronics, and more to be sold at the 2-day rummage sale on June 22 and 23.

Chuck Champlin, a long time GIVE project volunteer and member of the UCSB Optimist Club says, "GIVE is a quadruple win: the students don't have to throw things away; the streets aren't littered with stuff; the local organizations have a fundraiser when they volunteer; and, it's the best yard sale around! It makes me proud of our community - optimistic, actually!"






undergraduates who graduate from high school in Hawai'i.


